What is RRI?

Responsible Research and Innovation

societal challenges should be a primary focus of scientific research

moreover, there are methods by which that goals should be achieved

RRI actions are promoted by

- actions on thematic elements of RRI (public engagement, open access, gender, ethics, science education + governance)
- and **integrated actions** that for example **promote institutional change** to foster the uptake of the RRI approach by stakeholders and institutions.







Overall aim of the GRACE project

GRACE aims to contribute to spreading/embedding Responsible Research and Innovation in the European Research Area by

Facilitating sustainable processes of institutional change

- through the development of a set of **SMART Grounding Actions** (GAs) in a selection of **six RPFOs** with visible impacts,
- by coordinating a selection of GAs into specific **8-year long 'Roadmaps towards RRI'** specific for each consortium RFPO, using the first 3 years the GRACE project for paving the way of attaining further, more complex institutional changes in the medium- and long-term period (Y4–8),
- developing an approach that facilitates rapid institutional change, by providing expert support in the frame of a mutual learning process and a co-creation environment







Main assumption & concept

RRI has a role in the complex changes affecting R&I and institutional life/settings

RRI in GRACE

- a strategy to help RFPOs to manage the modifications affecting R&I, including their own internal mechanisms;
- an approach aimed not only at **promoting a better interaction between RFPOs** and external actors, but it also **provides more efficient means to cope with their** current activities e.g. research assessment, publications, labour relations, access to research funds, citizen engagement and citizen science.







Key features I.

'Roadmaps towards RRI'

An attempt to ensure sustainability in the RRI effort Tailored on the basis of the self-assessment and Linked to the GAs implemented within the project period

• Grounding Actions rather than Action Plans

Action/coordinated set of activities that put down the basis to facilitate the embedding of RRI keys in the institution

Contents vary by RRI key and institutional needs







Key features II.

• Co-creation and mutual learning

Expert organisations support the development and implementation of the GAs

Continuous mutual learning sessions to facilitate knowledge sharing among implementing organisations

Monitoring and mentoring scheme to ensure continual support

• Evaluation and impact assessment

Formative process evaluation for the benefit of the IOs

Immediate and long-term impacts of the GAs
